Tenth Anniversary of Summórum Pontíficum

July 7, 2017 marked the tenth anniversary of Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI's landmark Motu Proprio, *Summórum Pontíficum*, which freed any priest to celebrant the Traditional Latin Mass on his own initiative, no longer needing the permission of his bishop. The effects of this document on the spiritual lives of Catholics locally and globally has been immense. In the Archdiocese of Detroit alone, we have gone from only one location of the Tridentine Mass on July 6, 2007, to *fourteen* locations today, two with daily Mass. Weekday and special Masses have proliferated, in no small part due to the efforts of Juventútem Michigan. Much has been said about the significance of this anniversary and the work that remains to be done, but above all let us be grateful to God for the many graces that have come to the clergy and laity of this region through the increased availability of the Traditional Mass and Sacraments.

A Busy Time for Priest Training



Summer is traditionally slower for priests, which makes it an excellent time for out-of-the-ordinary pursuits. The past two weeks have seen five priests take advantage of Extraordinary Faith's Celebrant Training Program, in which priests are taught to offer the Traditional Mass in two days, at their parish, at no charge to them. Three of the priests wished to remain anonymous; the other two were Fr. Theo Lange, the new pastor of St. Catherine of Siena Parish in Veneta, Oregon, and Fr. Peter Do, OP, pastor of the University of Oregon's Newman Center in Eugene. Four of the five priests celebrated their first Tridentine Mass at the end of their respective training sessions. Fr. Theo is pictured here along with his new team of altar servers, who also participated in training of their own; he began offering the Mass in his parish on Sunday, July 2.

Clergy interest in the program continues: Another priest intends to take the training this coming week.

Assumption Church Annual Reopening in August
