## Fourteenth Metro Detroit Weekly Sunday Tridentine Mass Site Debuts on October 4: Ss. Peter & Paul Westside



For the third week in a row, another weekly Sunday Tridentine Mass location has been announced for our region: The *fourteenth* weekly Sunday Mass site, and (no increment this time) the 37<sup>th</sup> Traditional Mass site in metro Detroit and Windsor, debuts on <u>Sunday</u>, <u>October 4 at 2:00 PM</u> at Ss. Peter & Paul Westside Church in Detroit. Pastor

#### Immersion Pool in Front of a High Altar?



Every once in a while something comes along that represents such a profoundly

unfortunate

misunderstanding of Catholic liturgical order that words fail us. A reader brought to our attention that the Jesuit-run St. Francis Xavier Church in Manhattan installed

a baptismal immersion pool immediately in front of their High Altar. The High Altar is still there, but the placement of this new object makes it 100% certain that the altar can no longer be used for its originally intended purpose of hosting the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass. It makes one long for the more commonly seen repurposing of historic altars as shelves for flower pots.

In bringing this to our attention, the reader opined that it's actually intellectually more honest to remove historical architectural features from a church than to leave them there yet make them completely unusable. "It would be like if [a Latin Mass group] took over a church and decided to just build Side Altars that keep the old guitar band area visible but the band are blocked from getting to their instruments." Incidentally, this happens to be the same church that gained notoriety recently for having its congregation recite a "pledge for racial justice" during Mass. The bright side is that like any building modification, wreckovations of this sort can be, and have been, reversed in the future.

Training took place at the Church of the Visitacion [sic], which has undergone a restoration reinstalling the Communion Rail and removing the freestanding altar so all Ordinary Form Masses there are offered ad oriéntem.
