Christopher Sayers, R.I.P.



The metro Detroit and Windsor Traditional Latin Mass scene lost a major figure last week with the unexpected passing of Chris Sayers at age 60 on Wednesday, October 13.

Chris' father and uncle were both Episcopal priests. In the early 1980s, Chris because one of the prime movers for the restoration of the 1928 Book of Common Prayer, the Anglican equivalent of the Tridentine Mass.

Chris became an active member of and singer at St. John's Episcopal Church across from the Fox Theatre on Woodward Ave. in downtown Detroit.

Chris was also an old high school friend of this writer. At Detroit Country Day, Chris was known for his musical talents playing the saxophone and clarinet, and for taking the lead roles in the school musicals. He also shared an interest in mainframe computers and

became partner of this in writer a business which sold and serviced small mainframe systems. While in high school gently encouraged this writer to return to the practice of the Catholic faith. Later, he made persistent and thoughtful encouragement to start serving at the altar. At

least one Catholic thus owes his reversion and volunteering for the Church to Chris' calm, convincing, and steady persuasion.

When the Tridentine Mass began to gain traction in 2003, Chris offered to help develop a choral program worthy of the Traditional Liturgy. With extensive connections to professional singers and musicians, Chris became a member of Wassim Sarweh's choir, which has sung at St. Benedict (Assumption, St. Alphonsus, and Holy Name of Mary Churches in Windsor), St. Josaphat, the Oakland County Latin Mass Association/Orchard Lake, and Old St. Mary's. Chris also believed in the importance of putting the choir on the road, singing at special Masses all around the region, including St. Hugo, St. Aloysius, Shrine of the Little Flower, St. Matthew in Flint, and Holy Family in Saginaw. The choral sound you associate with Wassim's choir is in part due to Chris' skill in assembling talent.

When special occasion Masses needed additional personnel, Chris rounded up many of those people, including such prominent local figures as WRCJ-FM's Dave Wagner and former Kirk in the Hills Music Director and Basso Profundo Glenn Miller.

Have you ever thought about the paperwork and administration that need to go on behind the scenes to make a choir function? Most likely you haven't, because Chris did much of that work so that you didn't need to. But reflect on that for a moment...music selections need to be organized, schedules maintained, sheet music distributed to the choir members, and so forth. A natural organizer, Chris did all that. For example, he maintained a spreadsheet for the St. Benedict, OCLMA, and Old St. Mary's TLM choirs containing links to the sheet music the choir required for each week's selections.

A firm believer that quality altar serving needed to complement the singing if we were to enjoy first class liturgy, Chris occasionally volunteered to help teach some of our newer altar servers. Recently and memorably at the OCLMA/Orchard Lake, when servers got flummoxed during the revesting of the priest

before Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament, because the choir is located next to the altar in that chapel, Chris calmly and professionally stepped up and helped get the celebrant properly vested in cope.

Chris did all of this work

without seeking credit or attention. Week in and week out, he could be counted on to support the choirs, even if he wasn't actually singing at a particular site at the moment. Former St. Benedict and Phoenix, Arizona cathedral music director Matthew Meloche marveled at Chris' efficient competence and came up with a most fitting ersatz title for him: "MC of the Choir Loft". On top of these organizational skills, of course, Chris remained a talented singer of both Gregorian Chant and sacred polyphony.

Our regional Latin Mass scene will have a difficult time replacing a man of such dedication, talent, and dependability. Requiem Masses for Chris will be scheduled soon in both Windsor and Detroit. Réquiem ætérnam dona ei, Dómine, et lux perpétua lucéat ei. Requiéscat in pace. Amen.
