Dr. Peter Kwasniewski, theologian, liturgical scholar and composer of sacred music, is a graduate of Thomas Aquinas College in California and the Catholic University of America in Washington, D.C. He has taught for the International Theological Institute in Austria, the Franciscan University of Steubenville, and Wyoming Catholic College, which he helped establish in 2006.

He writes regularly for such sites as New Liturgical Movement, OnePeterFive, LifeSite News, Rorate Caeli, Crisis, The Remnant, and Catholic Family News. He has authored or edited twelve books. ## San Francisco Deaf Priest Training Report

An uplifting story: Congratulations to Fr. Paul Zirimenya, Pastor of St. Benedict Parish for the Deaf in San Francisco, California, who celebrated his first Traditional Latin Mass on Friday, February 11, 2022, after a week of training from Extraordinary Faith. Sign language interpreter Vanessa Green, stepdaughter of instructor Alex Begin, traveled along to provide the necessary translation. His enthusiasm and commitment to this challenge has been inspiring. Assisting priest Fr. Ghislain Bazikila also took part in the training. Fr. Paul believes the Tridentine Mass will be an important offering not only for his regular parishioners, but also for the broader San Francisco Latin Mass community, whom he hopes will come to St. Benedict once the TLM is added to the parish schedule.



Fr. Paul also would like to bring to the attention of other deaf priests and laypeople curious to learn more about the TLM that there is a special Latin class designed for deaf students held in London, England from time to time. The last was held in 2019, but hopefully London's Liturgy Institute will resume holding them as Covid restrictions ease.

## TLM Community Input for the Synod on Synodality

A reader asked how Catholics who attend the Traditional Mass can make their voices heard in the Synod on Synodality, as the whole point of that process is to solicit input from the faithful.

In the Diocese of London, Ontario, longtime altar server Matthew Charbonneau has been appointed to represent St. Benedict on the Windsor Heritage Family of Parishes synod committee.

In the Archdiocese of Detroit, there does not yet appear to be a process to address the Synod on Synodality, even though the deadline for reporting back to the USCCB is June 30, 2022.

The Diocese of Lansing has a whole series of web pages devoted to the topic at <https://www.dioceseoflansing.org/synod>. It appears to be up to each parish to designate representatives for the effort. Hopefully each of the parishes hosting the TLM will take advantage of this opportunity.

**LATIN FOR THE DEAF**  
6-10 OR 6-17 AUGUST 2018

**GREG CARRIER**  
Born deaf, Greg began studying Latin while reading medieval history at the University of Alberta, Canada. He quickly acquired a love for Latin, but was dissatisfied with the methodologies he encountered, until learning of Reginald Foster's method. He joined us for the summer of 2016 to refresh his Latin and familiarise himself with Reginald's method with a particular emphasis on self-study. He studies all year using this method and returned to study with us again in 2017. Greg teaches Latin at these levels:

- Beginning Latin for the d/Deaf
- Lower-Intermediate Latin for the d/Deaf.

*Trained by Daniel McCarthy, co-author with Reginald Foster, moderates these courses.*

**DANIEL MCCARTHY**  
Hearing, Daniel began a year of formal study of ASL in Olathe, Kansas. During seminary he attended the first Deaf Way conference at Gallaudet while associated with the University's chaplaincy. After ordination he signed the Mass with the Deaf community in Olathe. He is co-author with Reginald Foster. He teaches Upper-Intermediate Latin for the d/Deaf and serves as head of Latin for the summer program.

**METHOD OF INSTRUCTION**  
Guided self-study. Students begin each day by reading the Individual Encounter for that day in the *Encounter* book. During their session with the instructor, students discuss the material read. They read authentic sentences from Latin literature together for careful understanding. The student completes a *ludus domesticus* "home game" on his or her own and then discusses it with the instructor. At this rate the student may be able to complete one Encounter of the *Encounter* book each day, chosen according to the student's needs.

**BEGINNING LATIN**  
No knowledge of Latin is expected. Students work with the instructor on one Encounter daily chosen according to the student's needs.

**INTERMEDIATE LATIN**  
The student and instructor choose one Encounter for each day. The first intermediate course focuses on the four participles and their uses especially in the ablative absolute from Encounters 36-43. The second intermediate course focuses on the subjunctive and its use from Encounters 50-57.
