

Altar at Priest's Grave at Mt. Elliott Cemetery



Longtime Detroit area TLM supporter and talented graphic artist Mark Nemecek posted the following on Facebook about an unusual grave at Detroit's Mt. Elliott Cemetery, across the street from the Solanus Casey Center:

"There's a really incredible tombstone for a priest (maybe bishop?) as soon as you go through the gate, on the right. The whole tombstone has an altar and benches so a priest could celebrate Mass at his grave."

Minutes later, Nicole Scheier posted the above photo of the grave.

It's actually more ornate than even Mark described. The altar has candle holders and a missal stand, and choir stalls and a kneeler flank it so that faithful could attend a Mass celebrated there.

So who was the priest buried there? Fr. James G. Doherty died in 1926. Born in Ireland, he was ordained a priest of the Diocese of Detroit in 1876. He served as pastor of Detroit's St. Vincent de Paul Church, near the Michigan Central Depot, for 40 years. A newspaper obituary related the following impressive facts:

"In 1891 he established St. Vincent's Academy.

With the growth of Detroit's population, the schools increased considerably and today have an average attendance of about 850. The academy has given to Detroit a long roll of distinguished citizens, while a large number of students embraced the religious life. Over 200 of its girl students have become nuns of the Immaculate Heart of Mary at the Monroe convent, and about 100 others have joined other orders. Nearly 100 of its boys have become priests.

The educational standard of the academy was brought to such a high pitch by Monsignor Doherty that its graduates qualified immediately as teachers."

It's almost unimaginable that a priest of today could be such a font of religious vocations and educational productivity. It's similarly hard to imagine that a more contemporary version of this grave, incorporating a freestanding altar, would ever be constructed.
