


## The St. John Resort Chapel Before Renovation

Our July 16 and 23, 2023 columns covered the relocation of the Plymouth Third Tuesday 6:00 PM Tridentine Mass to the St. John Resort Chapel. In preparing that column, we searched for a prerenovation photo of that chapel. Alas, none was available on-line. An intrepid reader contacted Emily Berschback of the Archdiocese of Detroit, who in turn searched the Archdiocese's Archives and found one photo which depicts the original High Altar and the tester (overhang) above it, along with one of the refectory. The two statues to the sides of the High Altar are now located in the vestibule of the chapel. The artwork remains in the sanctuary, but the back wall is now partially covered by the pipe organ that was relocated from Blessed Sacrament Cathedral.





That reader posed an interesting question: Note that the Communion Rail only extends a short distance from the side walls. Was this an adaptation made right after Vatican II, or was there never a full rail there? It is possible that because St. John Provincial Seminary served only clerics, there was no need for a rail at which laypeople would kneel.
