#### Tridentine Mass Pilgrimages

After experiencing slow but steady growth over the past decade or two, the last year has seen an apparent explosion in the popularity of pilgrimages involving the Tridentine Mass.

Attracting the most attention over the past few years has been the multi-day Pentecost Pilgrimage from Notre Dame de Paris to Notre Dame de Chartres in France. Approximately 16,000 pilgrims took part in 2023, a 33% increase over 2022. The annual Pópulus Summórum Pontíficum pilgrimage in Rome continues each October on the Feast of Christ the King. This year's event concludes with a Mass on Sunday, October 29, celebrated by Msgr. Marco Agostini of the Secretary of

# Why Go on Pilgrimage? 9 Reasons


