A Guide to When to Sit, Stand, and Kneel

The rules for the posture of the faithful during Mass are not formal rubrics, but are rather considered local custom. Therefore you may see variations in what is practiced, site-to-site, and especially in different dioceses and countries. The below chart turned up on social media and, apart from our customary sitting for the Epistle in a Low Mass, represents the norm at most sites here in metro Detroit and Windsor. Note that you will also see similar instructions in the margins of the ubiquitous Red Missal.


A GUIDE TO WHEN TO SIT, STAND AND KNEEL

Bodily postures were never comprehensively codified by the rubrics, and these are only offered as a guide to help those attending the extraordinary form of the Roman rite. Depending on local customs different postures from these may be followed, particularly at Low Mass.

Mass for St. Thomas Aquinas at Rosary Shrine

This writer experienced an unexpected delight during a visit to London, England last week. On Thursday evening, March 7, the Dominican Rosary Shrine Parish held a special Dominican Rite High Mass for the feast of their patron, St. Thomas Aquinas. Previous editions of this column have made note of the massive size of this church, which incorporates 15 Side Altars that represent the mysteries of the Rosary. What this church sadly lacks, however, is a convenient location. Unlike many of the other churches in London which offer the Traditional Mass, the Rosary Shrine is in a relatively remote northern part of the metro area.



However, that did not deter the faithful from making the trek. The Southwell Consort [pictured], a professional choir of 15-20 voices, provided superlative polyphonic music, as well as Dominican Chant for the Propers. A lovely, musically exuberant experience, not common for an average weekday.
