#### Detroit Tridentine Mass Changes

As was widely expected, Archbishop Edward Weisenburger on Friday afternoon, June 13, published the new set of rules and regulations governing the celebration of the Traditional Latin Mass in the Archdiocese of Detroit. Much has been said on social media over the past few days about these changes, which will take effect on July 1. There will be only four remaining sites for the TLM, which were identified in the document, but as yet no Mass times have been published for two of the four sites. All weekday Tridentine Masses in the Archdiocese apart from St. Joseph Shrine will be canceled.

Once the Mass times for the new locations have been set, a future edition of this column will publish an updated list of the Tridentine Masses now available in our region, including in the Archdiocese of Detroit; the Diocese of London, Ontario; the Diocese of Lansing; and the Diocese of Saginaw.

# Saginaw Tridentine Mass Allowed to Continue

Last week Bishop Robert Gruss of the Diocese of Saginaw reversed his previous decision and renewed permission for the 3:00 PM Sunday Tridentine Mass at Holy Family Church to continue, pending further direction from the Vatican. Hand Missal History Project, an account on X, on June 12 posted the below photo of Our Lady of the Railways Chapel, located in Boston's main train depot, South Station. It operated from 1955 – 1972 and offered 18 (!) Sunday Masses and 4 daily Masses for the convenience of passengers.




